synopsis

NÜWA is an itinerant show inspired by Chinese mythology and one of its most powerful and fascinating figures: the goddess Nüwa, creator of the world and of humanity. This “mother goddess,” of transformative spirit, challenges traditional notions of power and gender and becomes a symbol of hope, regeneration and female empowerment.

In a contemporary world marked by violence, war, forced migration, disconnection from nature and the harm humanity has inflicted upon itself, Nüwa emerges as a creative force championing a new humanity: more interconnected, respectful, aware of its origins and deeply bound to the earth.

Riding a giant animatronic dragon — an ancestral figure linking the deity to the earthly world — Nüwa travels through the streets on a visual, sonic and emotional journey. The show combines dance, live vocals, light and movement to offer a poetic experience that invites the audience to imagine a possible future built on respect, diversity and collective care.



This project is a multidisciplinary itinerant visual show combining performing arts, mobile technology, live vocals and dance. At the heart of the proposal is a large animatronic dragon structure, around 4 metres tall and 8 metres long, fitted with sound, lighting and microphone systems that allow the lead performer, and the rest of the cast, to sing and communicate live with the audience.

Nüwa is the central figure and driving force of the narrative: she represents creative power, the capacity for regeneration and the will to rebuild a wounded world. The dragon, an ancestral and symbolic creature, is the link between the deity and the human world, between heaven and earth, between myth and contemporary reality.

project
description

The show unfolds in two main moments:

Opening: A static moment presenting the characters, with space for song and dance.

Itinerant procession: Nüwa moves through the streets aboard the dragon, accompanied by the dancers, who help drive the structure's organic movement — especially the tail — creating a living, poetic image. During the procession, Nüwa sings live at key moments, creating soundscapes that connect emotionally with the audience.

The narrative is built through symbols, images and emotions, offering an open reading that is accessible to diverse audiences without relying on language or literal dialogue.

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interest

The project stands out artistically, both visually and in conceptual and staging terms. The combination of a large-format animatronic element with live vocal performance, contemporary dance, mobile technology and visual arts creates an immersive, singular proposal of high aesthetic impact.

The figure of Nüwa brings a profound intercultural dimension, connecting Eastern mythology with contemporary universal issues. This contemporary retelling of an ancestral myth enriches the landscape of street arts with non-Eurocentric references and opens spaces for dialogue between cultures, traditions and ways of thinking.

On stage, the project brings together diverse disciplines — movement, singing, physical theatre, scenic sculpture and visual art — in a coherent, poetic and accessible language. Artistic quality is also reflected in the careful technical detail: the design of the dragon, the costumes, the lighting and the sound creation, all conceived specifically for public space.

Culturally, the show helps democratize access to the performing arts, bringing a large-format proposal into public space and fostering encounters between art, citizens and territory.

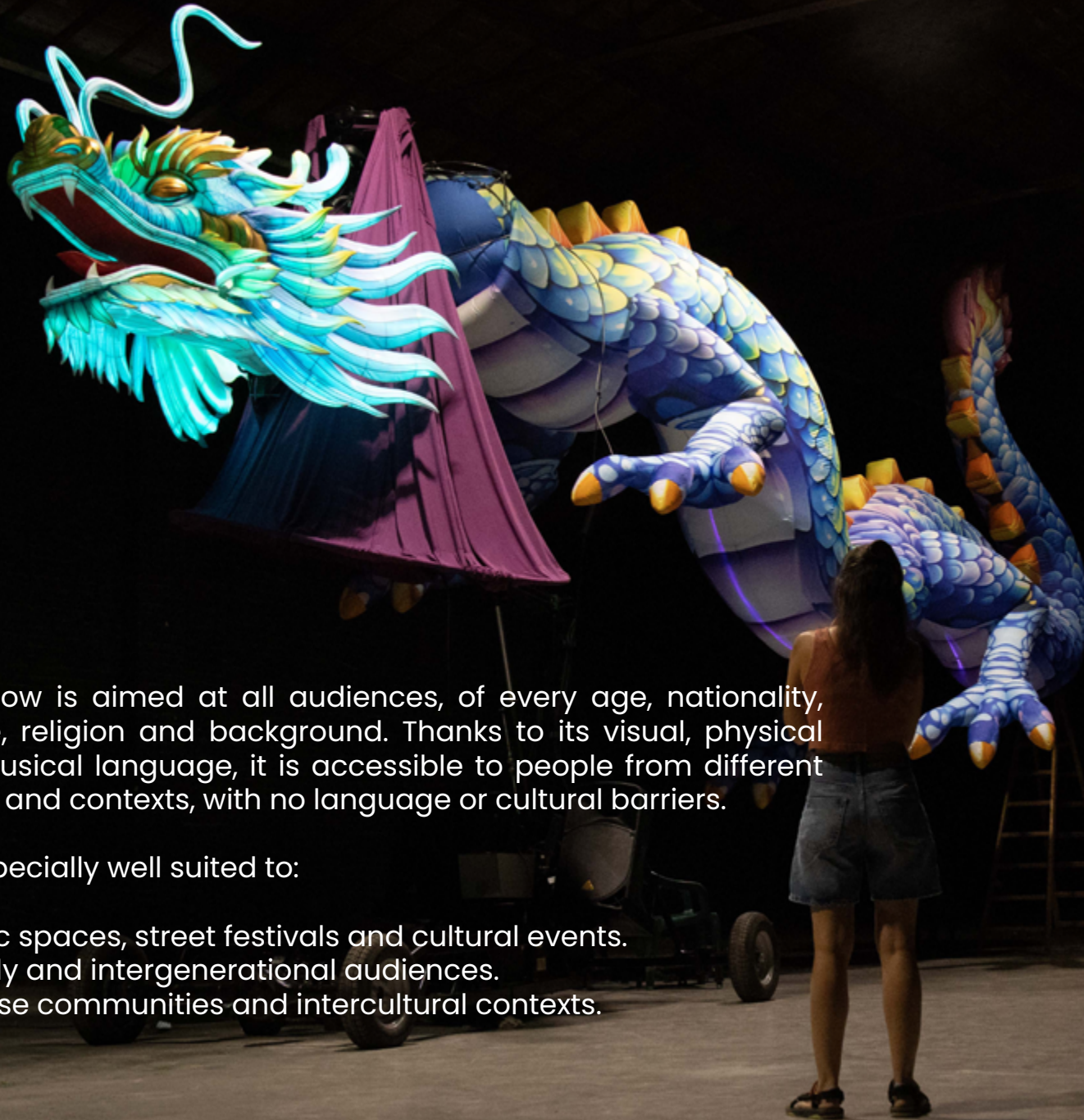
The show offers no closed answers, only images, emotions and metaphors that invite audiences to reflect on the present and to collectively imagine a possible future built on care, interdependence and shared responsibility.
